Dr. Mary Ann G. Bacolod is an associate professor at the Department of Linguistics, College of Social Sciences and Philosophy, University of the Philippines Diliman. Her research focuses on language documentation and description, morphosemantics, interlanguage grammar, Philippine lexicography, translation, and cross-linguistic studies. She served as member of the UP Monolingwal na Diksyunaryo ng Wikang Filipino project under UP OVCRD and is a member/consultant for Project Marayum, a community-built, mobile phone based, online web dictionary for Philippine Languages under the UPD College of Engineering and DOST. The Buhid Dictionary project with Asst. Prof. Elsie Marie T. Or is a collaborative work between the Buhid Mangyan Mission, UP OVCRD, and UP Department of Linguistics.
