Authorship Structure of Scholarly Disciplines:: An Application of Lotka's Law to Philippine Research Journals in the Social Sciences by Nathalie N. Dela Torre is a bibliometrics

study of authorship characteristics in the Philippines. Finally, this issue features the notable achievement of the SLIS since its establishment in 1961 and the abstracts of the best theses written by graduates of the School every semester since 2000 that manifest basic to advanced ICT applications.
